Notes from The Chair

Welcome to our spring newsletter which is a bit larger than normal owing to the amount of local news that we have gathered. It never ceases to amaze me how much is happening in our community!

Our first event of the year is our Spring Quiz, to be held at the WP Community Centre on Saturday 12 April. An evening of questions accompanied by an excellent supper and raffle, this is a fun event not to be missed! Tickets will be on sale soon.

The following day, Sunday 13 April, we are organising our regular 'Tidy Up at the Shops' at 10am. It's astonishing what can be done in an hour when volunteers get going!

At the end of April we are holding our AGM at the Community Centre. I will be reporting on the activities of the Residents' Association and inviting you to vote on the election of the officers and committee for the coming year. Our secretary Penny White is standing down at this meeting after many years of sterling service for which I heartily thank her. This leaves a vacancy on the committee. Should you be interested in joining us and finding out more about what is happening locally, you would be made very welcome. Please come along to the meeting or contact me in advance.

Our newsletter editor Andrea Hopkinson is also leaving as she is moving out of our area. We are looking for someone who enjoys writing to join the team that put this quarterly newsletter together. No editorial experience is needed, just an interest in what is going on in our community.

Following on from our very popular First Aid courses for adults last year, we are going to organise some more, but for the younger members of our community. These will run in the summer, and we'll have more details in our next newsletter but if any of your 11 to 18 year olds are interested in taking part, please get in touch and I'll make sure that they receive details when our dates are fixed.

You may have noticed that signs have gone up on Wrexham Road announcing roadworks starting at the Park & Ride roundabout. This is to provide access into the southern part of the Kings Moat estate where the school and shopping centre are located.

Work is due to start on Monday 3 March and will last until September. A 30 mph speed limit will be put in place and existing traffic lanes will be narrowed to try to maintain flow.

Work is also due to start on improvements to Overleigh roundabout this summer. Preliminary tree work will take place this month and the main

contractors are likely to start work in July. This may lead to some crossover between the two sets of works, but the aim is to get all the work done on this main arterial route as soon as possible.

The proposed Kings Moat primary school received planning permission in December and construction work should be starting soon. It is intended that the school will open in September 2026. I have been in touch with our MP Aphra Brandreth about the need for an improvement in GP provision for our residents.

She has taken this up with the Chief **Executive of NHS Cheshire and** Merseyside and is in the process of arranging a meeting to discuss their strategy for infrastructure development. I will update you when I have more news.

In the meantime, I hope to see you at one of our events. Otherwise, if you have any ideas for improvements in our community, please get in touch.


Without the WPRA, there would be no Gardening Club, no Evergreen club and, of course, no newsletter.

Following the tragically sad death of schoolboy, Evan Rothwell, on Wrexham Road in November there have been many calls for the 40mph speed limit to be reduced and for pedestrian arrangements to be reviewed outside the King's School. Two LED school warning signs have been installed on the north and southbound carriageways near the junction and an external independent review has resulted in the Council implementing an Experimental Traffic Regulation Order to reduce the speed limit to 30mph for an initial period of 18 months from March.

I've been having doorstep chats on Vincent Drive and Bartholomew Way, to hear about local issues and concerns. The main items to come up are unsafe parking on the bend, anti-social behaviour and speeding around school pick up time, all of which I will try to resolve.

The subject of the glass recycling bottle banks at the shops has prompted a number of emails to me and comments on Facebook. The containers are possibly going to be removed as they pre-date the kerbside recycling collection now in place. I have relayed residents' comments on the frequency of emptying of the containers and the number of bottles left around them and asked for more information about the maintenance schedule.

At a meeting with trustees of Westminster Park Community Centre, I discussed the annual summer fun day to see how I would be able to support it from my members' budget. As always, any constituted local groups who are after some funding can send in requests for my and Razia's budgets.

It was sad that the Westminster Park lights switch-on had to be cancelled due to the localised storms. I know a lot of work goes into organising these events and I was looking forward to attending. Let's hope for better weather in 2025!

Friends of Westminster Park



Our volunteers have started an exciting new project to transform the area next to the metal containers at the side of the park, creating a peaceful clearing with a bench, bird feeders and maybe a sculpture. After a few weeks spent removing horrendous fly tipping and cutting back brambles, it's now time to make the pathways.

The Woodland Trust is providing 300 saplings ('whips'): some will be planted as a visual screen around the metal fencing. Laying the hedge next to the football field continues and some of the new whips will be planted in the gaps to help preserve this ancient hedge. In the woods, the bug hotel which was burnt to the ground last summer has been reinstated. Hopefully the vandals will leave it alone this year. All of the bird boxes have been



scrubbed, repaired and re-installed ready for nesting season.

Good progress is being made with the area around the newly resurfaced BMX track. Most of the tangle of brambles has been removed and after the trees have been thinned, bluebells and shrubs will be planted.

Volunteers have undertaken City and Guilds training in 'safe use and maintenance of hedge cutters' so the power tools (given by the Council) can be used safely – strimmer training next! Why not come and join us, you will be most welcome: Wednesdays 10-12. Find us in the park, gloves and tools provided.

Celebrating our local public library - 60 years old!

As Albert Einstein said: 'the only thing you absolutely have to know is the location of the library' and Westminster Park residents are extremely fortunate to have a fine example on the doorstep - Lache Library, which recently marked its 60th birthday.

It's hard to imagine the area without the library which came into being following a petition to Chester City Corporation by the Lache Community Association in 1957. The site was purchased in 1959 and building work began in 1963. Records show that some furniture was ordered from Conran and the entrance desk (incorporating a hand washing basin for children), shelving and some chairs were made from African mahogany. The doors opened on Wednesday 20 January 1965.



All libraries are in a constant state of development and today our library offers so much more than free access to all types of reading materials (which is, of course, still hugely appreciated!). It is also a hub for research and fact finding and a place of companionship where advice can be sought for social and health care. There are social activities for all ages including craft and hobby clubs, jigsaws, holiday reading challenges, story and rhyme times and Lego sessions for children.



Recently, a series of winter afternoon classical concerts delighted local residents. A grant funded performances in the library, enabling local people to stroll from their front

 c) doors to hear and enjoy a range of instruments and composers at a

reasonable cost (£10 per ticket). These have been very well-received and it is hoped that there will be another season in the future.

Of course, the north-west has other notable public libraries that are considerably older than ours and which are well worth a visit. It's only possible to look around on a guided tour and tickets can be easily bought and booked online. https://library.chethams.com.

John Rylands Research Institute Library in Manchester celebrates its 125th anniversary since doors opened in 1900. It was founded in memory of Rylands by his wife, Enriqueta, who was closely involved in the design and construction of this notable neo-Gothic building. She also oversaw the acquisition of two hugely significant collections of books and manuscripts that form the foundation of the catalogue.

Chetham's Library in Manchester has been in continuous use as a public library for over 350 years. Housed in a beautiful sandstone building dating from 1421, built to accommodate the priests of Manchester's Collegiate Church, the library's collection has been growing since its opening in 1653. It contains medieval manuscript diaries, letters and deeds, prints and paintings plus the oldest history of Manchester – Richard Hollingworth's 1656 'Mancuniensis' and a very large collection of further material relating to Manchester and its region.

It was in this place that Karl Marx and Friedrich Engels met to discuss their revolutionary ideas and, much earlier, Dr John Dee supposedly summoned the devil. Liverpool's strikingly modern Central Library, is a remodelled building in the vicinity of St George's Hall, the Walker Art Gallery and the World Museum. It offers a wide variety of talks, activities, support groups, discussion and story time sessions in addition to usual lending and reading facilities.

Rare collections are housed in the 19th C Picton Reading Room and the 1906 Hornby Library. Both of these Grade II listed buildings are attached to the Central Library and are a delight to visit. Every Wednesday, a page is turned on the library's cherished copy of John James Audubon's book on Birds of America the most famous and valuable of the library's natural history books - and there is a spectacular rooftop view over the local area from its top floor outdoor terrace. https://liverpool.gov.uk/libraries/explore-

Work starting on Wrexham Road roundabouts and Kings Moat School

Road works are due to begin on 3 March on the Heronsway South (Park & Ride) roundabout when a 30 mph speed limit will be introduced. Some lanes will be narrowed but hopefully traffic will continue to flow freely.

Alterations to the roundabout are necessary to complete the spine road passing along the length of the development and link with the junctions at the King's School and Heronsway North roundabout. This road provides access to the new school and commercial centre as well as the Park & Ride site. Work should be completed by September.

Plans are advanced for alterations to the Overleigh roundabout. Work should start around July/August, but lead up work will take place soon to remove trees before the nesting season. Some trees earmarked for removal have already fallen down in recent storms.

Primary School planning application approved

On 3 December the Council's planning Committee approved the plans for the construction of the new primary school on the Kings Moat estate. Construction should begin soon and the school is scheduled to open in September 2026.



54 more homes to be built

Redrow's planning application to build 54 more homes on the Moat Farm site was also approved by the Council in December. The homes will range from 1 to 5 bedrooms and the site will have 30% affordable housing, some rented and some shared ownership. Construction is due to start in six months' time.

International film time

Chester's International Film Festival will run from 21 March – 3 April at Storyhouse, in partnership with Storyhouse and University of Chester. Founded by Chester Film Society, it is an annual celebration of world cinema including specially chosen international film previews, short film programmes, guest speakers and an animation film festival.

Are you concerned about traffic speeding on Lache Lane?

Have you noticed a rise in the volume and speed of traffic on Lache Lane? Have you found crossing the road stressful? Have you been concerned for the safety of cyclists or just annoyed by the noise of high-speed traffic, day and night?

If you recognise any of these issues, you are not alone. Many local residents are concerned about the speed and behaviour of some drivers on the Lane. Drivers often fail to slow on entering the 30-mph zone next to the 'Donkey Field'. Travelling away from the city, many accelerate to illegal speeds long before leaving the 30 zone; but concerns are expressed all along Lache Lane.

Speeding is a long-standing problem, but a 'culture' of disregard for the speed limit - by some, not all - seems to have become entrenched. Accidents traceable to speed have occurred on Lache Lane. During 2023, 29,711 people were seriously injured or killed (1624 fatalities) on UK roads. Speed was the main factor in 56% of the incidents.

Measurements of vehicles numbers and speeds were made by Cheshire Highways during February 2024, at a point 250 metres towards the city from the start of the 30-mph zone (outside houses 140 / 167). These confirmed that, particularly at peak times, most vehicles exceeded 30 mph.

Cheshire Police have primary responsibility

for enforcing legal limits, but resource to 60 minutes, they recorded and reported limitations restrict the time our PCSO can only vehicles that were exceeding 35 mph - a spend by the roadside.

Therefore, some residents have formed a Community Speed Watch association to supplement Police activities. Several members of the group have undergone training by the Police in procedures, safety investigates the purchase of their own and reporting. The training covers where to stand and how to collect and report observations of speeding vehicles. These reports trigger a warning letter from the Police to offending drivers.


Towards the end of 2024 volunteers participated in sessions measuring vehicle speeds using a hand-held radar monitor loaned by Dodleston Parish Council. They worked in the section of Lache Lane within efforts. Dodleston Parish from the Donkey Field to Greenacre Road. During sessions lasting 30

total of 70 during these trial periods. It was very worrying to observe vehicles, some of them larger commercial lorries and vans. travelling above 40 or even 50 mph.

The efforts are paused while the team equipment. The volunteers are keen to extend their activities along the road and encourage road users to observe the legal limit - it's not difficult!

Speeding along a heavily used residential road is a deeply antisocial behaviour that all too often has tragic consequences.

The volunteers have been encouraged by vocal support from residents for their early

Our group started off literally as two men and a dog but a year on we are a constituted group and a recognised 'player' by the powersthat-be and we would now like to get more people onboard to make our voice even stronger. So if you are interested in helping, please make
